Three unique memorials were recently designed to honor the late Det. Steven McDonald:


One is the DEA's 2018 commemorative card. created with McDonald's likeness against the backdrop of the navy blue, white, and emerald stripes of the New York Department's Police flag. Our coveted annual commemorative cards

are sold to our own members to raise funds for various union causes, and the DEA thought it was fitting to honor our world-renowned Detective, who passed away on January 10, 2017. He brought an incalculable level

of respect and esteem to the Department, the Detective Bureau, and the DEA. His image on our cards will keep a constant reminder of his presence in our hands, as well as in our hearts.

The Community Affairs Officers of the Central Park Precinct, to which McDonald was assigned, have also created a mobile memorial: a Steven McDonald challenge coin. While the Precinct recently named a street after the indefatigable Detective, the coin is something that can also be given, as a travelling keepsake, to friends and family. Central Park, the jewel of Manhattan, is the particular area of the City which, in 1986, took McDonald's health, but yet, it's the place he served for his remarkable 32-year career, and it's the place that, ultimately, gave his life its greater purpose.

Another wholly original memorial to Steven McDonald has been created by an overseas company, Pricky Thistle, maker of bespoke tartans in Scotland. The idea originated with a Scottish woman named Claire Ward, who heard about Steven after reading about Father Mychal Judge, the FDNY Chaplain who died on September 11, 2001. Ward traveled to the United States to participate in the 2016 Father Mychal Judge Walk of Remembrance, where she met McDonald, a close friend of the late Chaplain and one of the Walk's founders. When Ward returned to Scotland, she kept in touch with Steven, and when he passed away, she thought a unique, family tartan might be an appropriate way to honor him. She proposed the idea to Capt. John Bates, a retired maritime pilot who was one of Steven's
